What are the issues?

Learning Objectives:

- In this lesson, we will achieve a better understanding of what sustainable transport is, and why we should choose to travel sustainably
- We will also try to make decisions about what we can do in our school to encourage more pupils to walk or cycle to and from school

- The Government is encouraging everyone to use sustainable transport whenever possible rather than cars.
- Sustainable transport means walking, cycling or public transport (e.g. buses or trains).







Scientists are worried that the pollution caused by cars is harming our environment.





Doctors want us to walk and cycle more to help keep us fit and healthy.

Even buses cut down on pollution, as they can carry up to 70 people, yet emit only half of the CO_2 of a car.



- A lot of primary school children who come to school by car live close enough to walk or cycle.
- About 20% of the cars on the road just before 9am are on school journeys. That's lots of extra cars adding to the congestion and causing pollution!

Parents at some schools run 'walking buses' where children walk to school in groups with adults who volunteer to help.

Some have 'cycle trains' where small groups cycle together with adult volunteers.





Some schools have a 'park & walk' place (like a supermarket or church car park) where parents leave their cars so that children can walk the rest of the way to school from there.
